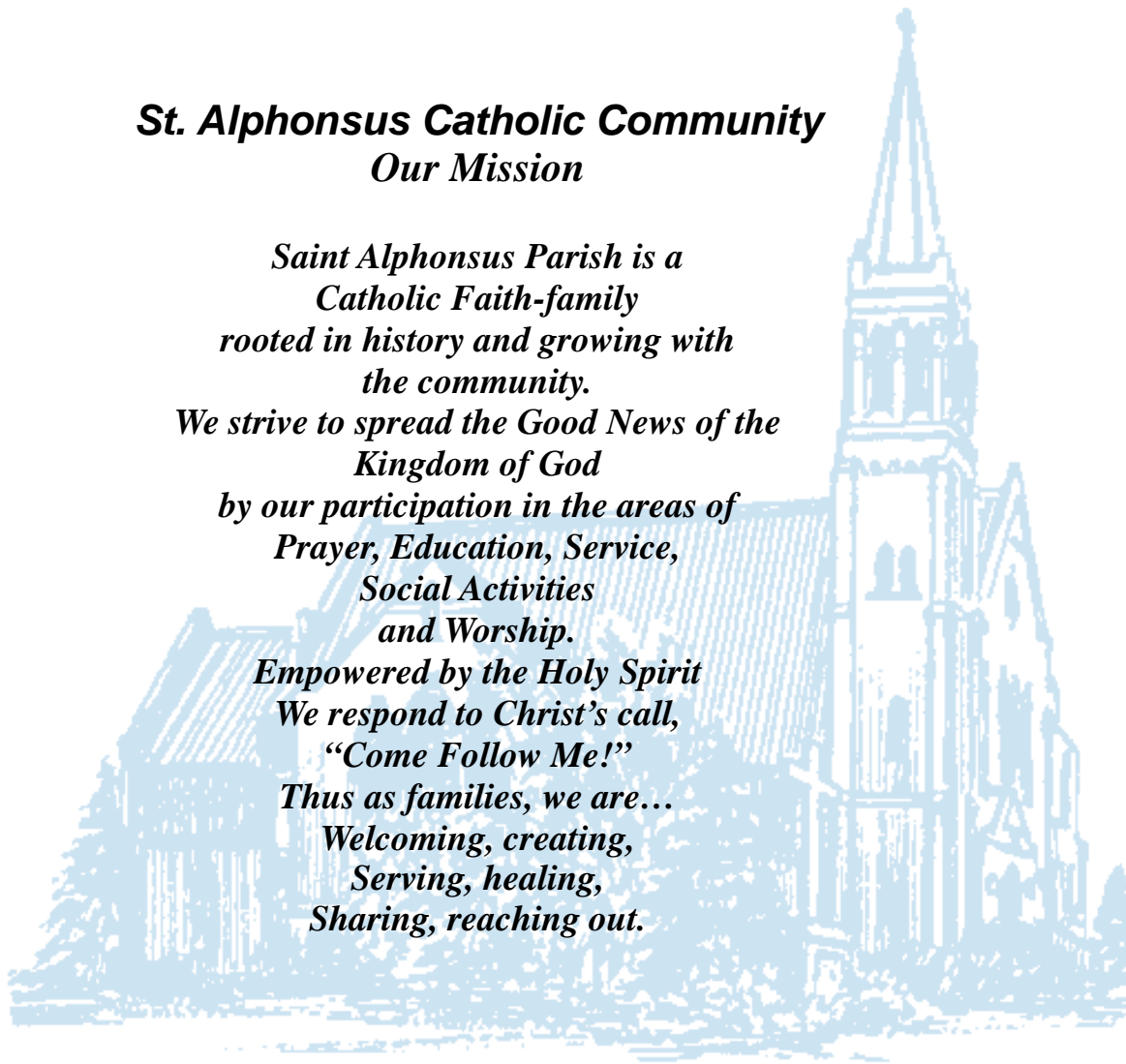

The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

The New Covenant

Perhaps this year we could refer to this feast day as "The Blood and Body of Christ," since the readings we have today use the word "blood" so frequently-eight times to one use of the word "body." The New Testament authors, when referring to the sacrificial aspect of Jesus' death on the cross, never refer to him giving his body as a sacrifice for our salvation, but only speak of the shedding of his blood. In both Testaments, it is blood that is the primary source and sign of the covenant between God and people. In our day, while we speak quite a bit about the Mass as a sacrifice, it is a bit of an anomaly that we focus so much (almost exclusively, sometimes) on the symbol of the bread become Body rather than the wine become Blood to give the life of the New Covenant. Here, as in almost every part of life, we would benefit more

Bloodless Body?

We have been given a deep and rich pair of symbols to express the fullness of Jesus' self-gift on the cross. In its celebration of the Eucharist, even when reception of Communion by all the faithful was infrequent and when the emphasis was on looking upon (called "ocular" communion) rather than receiving the elements, the Church has always preserved the duality of these symbols, since the sacrifice of Christ would not have been possible without both blood and body. So, too, is it for us who are sent from the Eucharistic celebration. We are not merely "Christ-ed" bodies in the world; we need to be the very Blood of Christ coursing through the veins of daily life at home, in the workplace, at school-wherever the Spirit leads us and guides us. As we pray "Lord, send your Spirit on these gifts," we must also pray that the same Spirit is sent upon us through the thanksgiving of our Eucharist, so we may become Body-and Blood-for the life of the world.



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Treasure From Our Tradition

The origins of today's solemnity lie in thirteenth-century Belgium. In those days, people seldom received Holy Communion, and never the chalice. A nun in a troubled convent, Juliana of Liège, devoted her life to stirring up love for the Eucharist, lobbying for a feast day to honor the Blessed Sacrament with Masses and processions.

Juliana may have been inspired by the Ascension Day processions in nearby Bruges. Crusaders brought a treasure home to Bruges from Constantinople in 1204: a reliquary said to contain a cloth from Joseph of Arimathea with

which he had helped prepare the body of Jesus for burial. The stain on the cloth was said to be the holy blood itself, and so the people of Bruges built a great basilica to house the relic. Bruges became a great center of pilgrimage because of this treasure, and the procession of the Holy Blood is still one of the greatest festivals in Belgium today. The bishop carries the relic through the narrow streets, and the people wear medieval costumes and act out scenes from the Bible.

Jesus, whose blood is the blood of the new covenant, shed that precious blood on the cross, saving us from sin and promising us everlasting life. Blood is the life source that courses through our bodies. The precious blood of Christ is the life source for our spirits. Today may we, like the psalmist, offer a sacrifice of thanksgiving to the Lord, whose body and blood strengthens us to bring the Good News to everyone we meet.

Do You Find That Your Teen Is Talking To You Less?

If all you seem to be getting from your teen are grunts, a yeah, or other one-word answers to questions, don't fret According to the Search Institute, talking less to parents is normal teen development. As parents, we often struggle with this predictable change. It can be uncomfortable and down right scary at times. Many parents may feel hurt or upset when they feel pushed away by their teen, and may be confused as to how to open communication when their child appears unwilling to participate. But keeping lines of communication open is important during the teen years. Steve Sasso of Sasso Seminars offers the following tips for getting conversations going:

Adapt - Do not take it personally that your teen is speaking less to you, but rather adjust the way you communicate to meet his new needs and capabilities

Practice Listening - Don't assume your teenager wants you to fix things when he is struggling. Often he just needs you to listen and validate his experience.

Facilitate Problem Solving Skills - Teens have to learn to problem-solve. When you intervene you are depriving your daughter of learning a very important life skill.

Model Respect - Respect your teen's need for autonomy and privacy. Talking less does not mean that she is trying to hide things from you. Let her know you will be there when she needs you. Keeping your eyes open will help you notice when she is struggling with something. Check it out by asking how she is doing.

Counseling By Fr. Rohrich

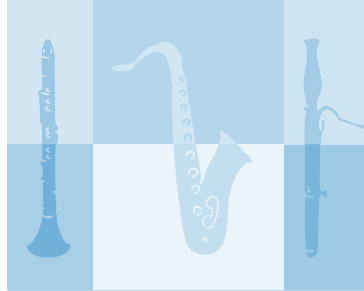

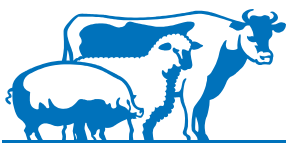

American Cancer Society Relay For Life of Lemont and Homer Glen July 10 – 11th

The American Cancer Society's Relay For Life of Lemont and Homer Glen will be from 6 p.m. July 10 to 6 a.m. July 11 at the Lemont High School Sports Complex, 131st and Bell Road .

Relay For Life is an overnight event that brings together the community in the fight against cancer. Relay For Life is not an athletic competition, but rather a walk where at least one team member walks around the field throughout the night, signifying that cancer never sleeps.

Teams of 8 -15 members are now forming. Teams raise money before and at the event to help fund cancer research, early detection and prevention programs and local services for cancer patients and their families.

Any person who has had cancer is invited to take part in the survivors' lap and survivors' reception which is at 6 p.m. – 7:30 p.m. at the beginning of the event. Registration is free to cancer survivors and their caregivers but registration is required.

Luminaria are sold for \$10 each in memory of those lost to cancer, those who have cancer and those who fought and won. When the sun goes down, hundreds of luminaria light the way under the stars, and the names of those being remembered are read.

Volunteers are needed to help the day of the event for set-up, traffic management, registration, and other logistic tasks.

Due to newly implemented government regulations in all hospitals, parishes will NOT be informed of any parishioner's hospitalization NOR will that information be available to any visiting clergy and/or parish visitor. It is strictly your responsibility to let us know of your hospitalization. A hospital can notify us only if you specifically request this at the time of admissions.

Flag Day—Today, June 14th

Although there are many stories of activities and events that contributed to the grass roots efforts to establish an official Flag Day, there appear to be three people who drove the primary events and activities that led us to the 1949 resolution. The first is Bernard J. Cigrand who, at the age of 19 was teaching at Stony Hill School in Waubeka Wisconsin. On June 14, 1885 he placed a 10", 38 star flag in an ink bottle on his desk and asked his students to write about the flag and what it meant to them. Mr. Cigrand followed this with a personal campaign over many years to establish June 14th as Flag Birthday'. He wrote numerous letters and articles for magazines to raise awareness and drum up support for this designation.

The second significant catalyst was Professor George Bolch, a principal of free kindergarten for the poor in New York City. On June 14, 1889 Professor Bolch planned a celebration of Flag Day' in New York City for school children. The New York State Board of Education took notice of this event and in 1891 adopted the idea citywide. By 1894 the Governor of New York directed that the flag be flown on all public buildings on June 14.

The third key individual was Elizabeth Duane Gillespie, a direct descendant of Benjamin Franklin. On April 25, 1893 while serving as the President of the Society of the Colonial Dames of America, she led that organization to adopt a resolution requesting the mayor of Philadelphia to display the flag on government buildings on June 14. On May 8, 1893 this action was endorsed by the city of Philadelphia.

Although progress was being made on the local level in the late 1800's it was 1916 before progress was made on the federal level. On May 30, 1916 President Wilson issued a proclamation calling for a national Flag Day. An additional proclamation was issued by President Coolidge in 1927.

The final step was taken on August 3, 1949 when President Harry S. Truman signed the National Flag Day Bill officially designating June 14 as a national holiday. This bill requests that the President issue an annual proclamation calling for this observance and for the display of the Flag of the United States on all Federal Government buildings. On June 9, 1966 Congress adopted a joint resolution to amend the legislation asking that the President issue annually a proclamation designating the week in which June 14 occurs as National Flag Week' and calling upon all citizens of the United States to display the flag during that week.

The stars and stripes can be seen flying from all Federal buildings, most State buildings and numerous private homes during National Flag Week as we take the opportunity to recognize and remember the adoption of this sym-
