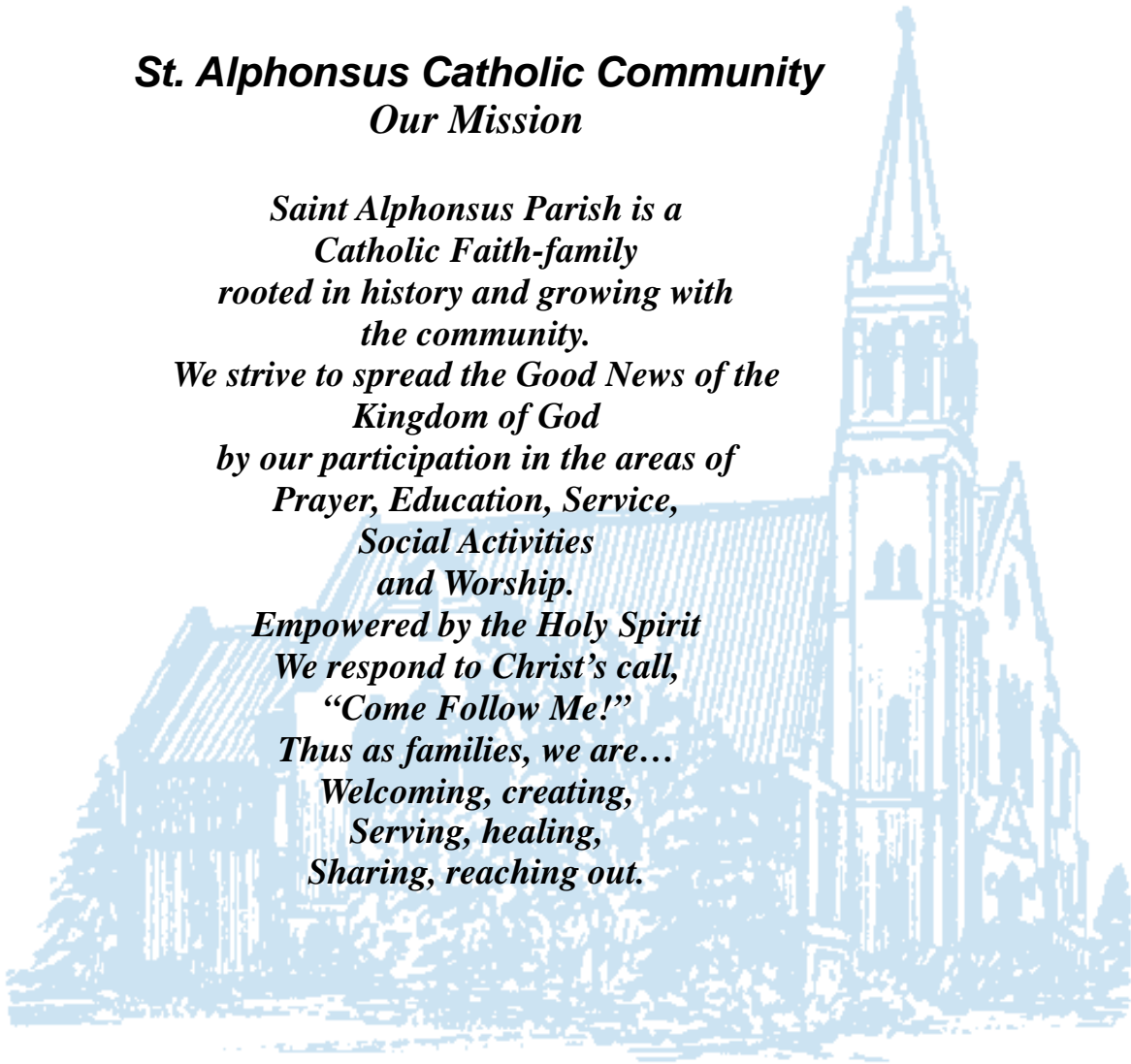

FRUITFUL OR PRODUCTIVE?

“Yes,” said Joel, “I’m hooked on productivity. I run a business, and my wife and I have three young children. I have to produce and my employees have to produce if we’re to accomplish anything. My days are jam-packed. If there’s any time left over I spend it with my family.” Joel’s thinking on productivity

received a shake-up at a men’s retreat. The retreat leader asked a question. “When you think of Jesus, do you think of him with a daily to-do-list? (‘Three people healed today. Two fast comebacks to the scribes and Pharisees. One really great parable told. Oh yes, and dinner for 5,000. And I got the disciples to distribute the leftovers. A very good day. Well done, me’).” Joel listened intently.

“Jesus spoke wisely and constantly extended mercy and grace. He might now and then retreat from the crowds, yet when he was with people, he was really with them. He saw needs that others could not see. He loved people well. But was he productive? Productivity can become a mind-set of constantly moving forward. Being busy also, can become a lifestyle. Productivity seeks what fruitfulness claims as its starting point — the assurance of God’s presence and love.”

Fruitfulness, Joel saw, allows you to be fully present in the moment. Fruitfulness is deeply rooted in the soil of God’s grace. Fruitfulness requires a fundamental trust in the Holy Spirit, like compost around the roots of the fig tree in today’s Gospel. The Spirit is working at all times and in all places and, if we allow it, is at work in us — busy or not.

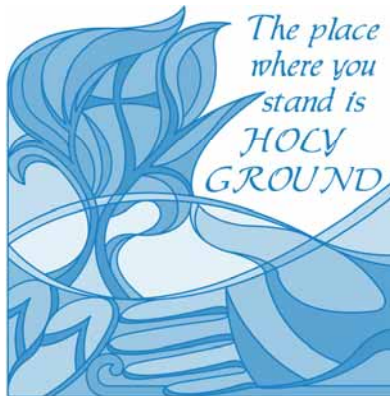
*Put aside the lists and waste some time with God —

The Mysterious One

Last Sunday we gathered with Peter, John, and James at the mountain of Transfiguration and were summoned to listen to God's chosen Son. This week the scriptures draw us into the mystery of just who that God is. The first reading, perhaps one of the best known in the Bible, recounts the story of Moses and the burning bush, when the mysterious divine name is revealed. The responsorial psalm is a hymn extolling the attributes of God. Saint Paul and the Lord Jesus describe a God who judges and metes out punishment. No matter the lengths to which the scriptures go, we know that no amount of words will ever come close to capturing who God is. Our lives and our Lents are really journeys toward that mysterious One who will one day welcome us into the heavenly home that awaits those who put their trust in God alone.

St. Frances of Rome (1384-1440) ~ March 9

Nature and human nature — plagues and wars — turned late medieval Rome into a living hell, particularly for the sick and poor. Frances, by birth and marriage well provided for, was a devoted wife and mother, but like Benedictine Oblates who, to this day, “pray and work” while living with their families and working in the world, she joined like-minded laywomen friends in ministering to society's most vulnerable. Frances' charity was not only “hands on” but “in home.” Her palace becoming a hospital after the plague claimed two of her three children. When her husband's death ended their loving marriage of forty years, Frances joined other widowed Oblates in community. In an interesting link to the United States, our nation's premier religious congregation for women of color, the Oblate Sisters of Providence, in 1833 established bonds of spiritual communion with these “Oblates of Saint Frances” in Rome.

From the Principal's Desk

The school community began our Lenten season with Mass and ashes. Father Shannon was the celebrant, and his homily was so appropriate to the children. He told us that we can't see the ashes on ourselves, but we can see them clearly on others; and only others can see them on us – kind of a vision that in order to get closer to God during Lent, we must see others first. Seeing others first is difficult for all of us. Our culture tells us that we must be beautiful, smart, clever, powerful and rich. Yet the Gospel tells us that we must be humble, poor in spirit, gentle, meek, and peacemakers – a pretty tall order.

Lent calls all of us to reflect on these things. It surely isn't so much "giving up" things – although the idea of sacrifice is to help us build inner strength – it's changing the things that keep us from becoming closer to God. For each person that's very different – and can be far more difficult than the sacrifice of prayer and almsgiving that lent traditionally asks of us.

A wonderful family exercise would be a kind of family examination of conscience. Have a simple dinner and then discuss how, as a family, we could grow closer to God. Don't be afraid to look at the really hard stuff. Do we gossip about others? Are we jealous of our neighbors? Do we do enough for the poor? Do we support the Church? Do we go to church? These are not easy questions to answer, but the fact that we are thinking about them enough to discuss them with our children sends a message to them that we are serious about Lent. Then plan to do one activity a week between now and Easter that will bring your family closer to God. Let us pray for each other during this season of Lent.

SHEEP-\$120 EACH

Know that the Lord is God.

It is he who made us and we are his; we are his people, the sheep of his pasture. Psalm 100:3
I am the good shepherd, and I know mine and mine know me, just as the Father knows me
and I know the Father; and I will lay down my life for the sheep. John 10: 14-15

Able to adapt to cold, rocky mountains or hot, dry plains, sheep have supplied people with fleece and skins for 12,000 years. Over time, people discovered that beating wet, unwoven wool produced thing, rain-proof felt—ideal for tent coverings and shoe linings. They drank sheep’s milk and made candles from sheep tallow. Today, people around the world value sheep’s wool to make knitted and woven clothing that is warm in winter and cool in summer.

Sheep offer many advantages. They flock together, making them easy to control. They are ruminants, which means they can digest roughage and they don’t need a lot of water. They have two or three lambs a year, which are ready for market in about five months. But sheep require more care than some other farm animals, and they can be hard on fragile land. Heifer partners limit the amount of grazing their sheep do, rotating their pastures, or keeping them in roomy grazing pens part of the time and carrying specially grown fodder to them. Most families raise sheep for wool, but some raise them for meat. Everyone values sheep manure to fertilize their vegetable gardens.

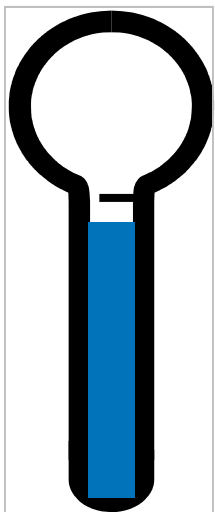
Introduction to Theology of the Body ~
