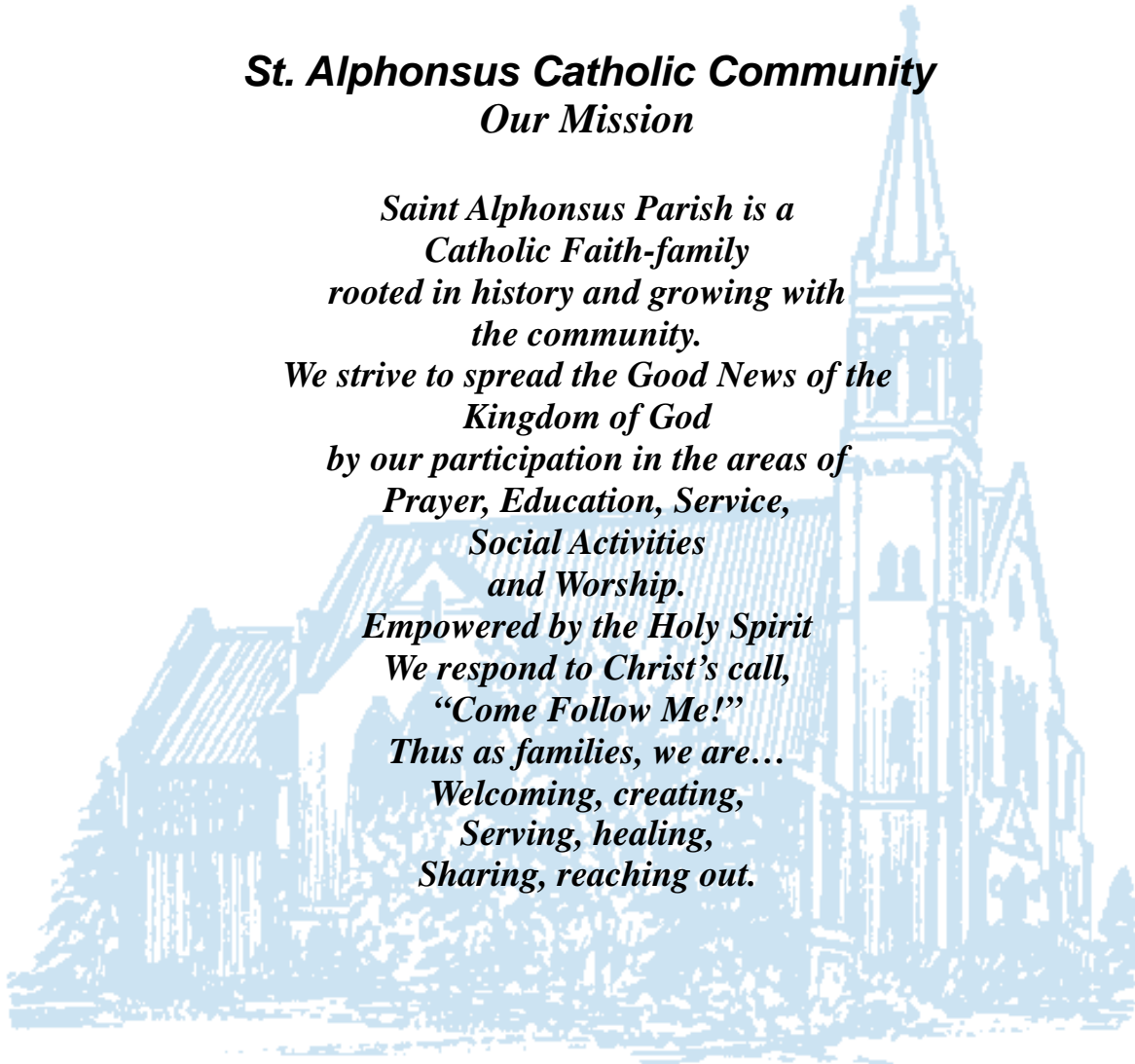

## Mixed Message

Words are funny things. Over long periods of time they can take on new meanings, sometimes the opposite of what they originally meant. So it is with the word diversity, which originally meant opposite, different. Reactions to our human differences range all the way from suspicion to outright violence. As our world has shrunk through global travel and migration,

we have tried to develop ways of thinking difference, or diversity, seem like a positive thing. One Catholic parish, with significant numbers of new parishioners speaking Spanish and Vietnamese, tried to tackle this in a new mission statement, including some lofty language about diversity. “The concept of diversity includes acceptance and respect . . . Appreciating each other and moving beyond simple tolerance to embracing and celebrating the rich dimensions of diversity in a safe, positive, and nurturing environment.” At a meeting where, once again, complicated arrangements were underway for each language group to have separate liturgies, one person commented that the new mission statement did not reflect any new reality in the parish. “The parish is still separated in worship, in faith formation, and even in community involvement and giving” he said. Some Anglo parishioners remarked angrily to the pastor that “those people” (other language speakers) do not give “their fair share” (meaning money). Saint Paul, according to today’s reading, would characterize this as “biting and devouring one another” (Galatians 5:15). He reminds us that the greatest commandment is to love our neighbor as ourselves. What a challenge that is when we sometimes find it difficult to get along with family and close friends. But, as Christ’s disciples, everyone who comes to our parish is by definition a brother or sister in Christ. Everyone. No exceptions.

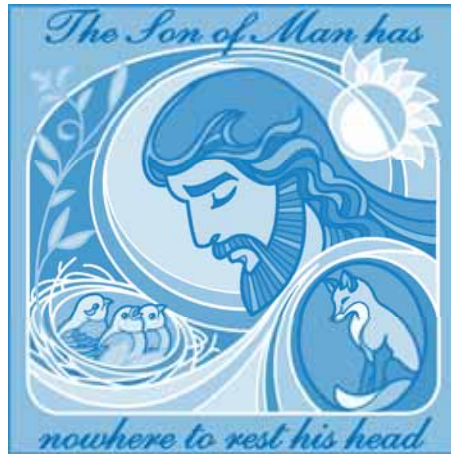

He recognizes in Elijah's call that he must follow faithfully and not look back.



Psalm 16 celebrates the loving protection of God for those who depend on God's love and mercy. God is our portion and cup, in a line seen by Christians as a poetic reference to Eucharist, and God will not abandon us to death and corruption, but will call us into the holy Presence forever. This could be seen as resurrection, something that was not universally believed in the days before Jesus. We are assured that if we go forth in confidence to follow God's daily call, we will not be shamed or abandoned, but will find the life we seek.

## We Care for God's Animals: Zebras (by Joey S. - 4<sup>th</sup> Grade)

Zebras are mammals that are originally from Africa. Zebras are African equids. That means they are hoofed mammals sometimes known as being part of the horse family. Zebras are mostly known for their black & white stripes. Did you know zebras each have their own unique black and white striped patterns?



When zebras communicate they use high pitched barks and whinnying. To show they are angry they pull their ears backwards. They have excellent eyesight and great hearing. This is very helpful to protect themselves from predators. There are three types of zebras, the plains, the grevy's, and the mountain zebras. The mountain and the grevy zebras are endangered, while the plain zebras are much more plentiful. There was another type of zebra, the quagga, but it went extinct in the late nineteenth century. You can find zebras in grasslands, savannas, woodlands, thorny scrublands, mountains, coastal hills, and at your local zoo.

## Key Findings: Faith and Practice Survey

Thanks to all who participated in the Archdiocese's Faith and Practice Survey in April. The survey included questions that were directed at all teenage and adult Catholics, and others that were specifically directed at teenagers, adults, parents, and catechists.

An executive summary of the survey is posted online at [www.archchicago.org](http://www.archchicago.org).

The survey provided insight on a wide range of topics. A few highlights include:

- There is a major opportunity and need to increase the participation of teenagers in parish life. In our survey, Mass attendance as a teenager was the strongest predictor of adult Mass attendance. Significant numbers of teenagers and parents expressed an interest in having more opportunities and activities for Catholic teenagers, and the teen survey provided ideas as to what might make those activities more attractive.
- There is a need to improve the understanding of the meaning and the value of the sacraments.
- Catholic parents, even most of those who attend Mass infrequently, still want to pass a Catholic identity to their children, and to make sure that they are baptized and receive First Communion. This represents an opportunity to do more to evangelize these parents and their families.
- Although respondents scored very well on a "quiz" of basic Church teachings, many Catholics wish they knew more about their faith.

The Archdiocese will use the findings from the survey to work with parishes across the Archdiocese to improve our evangelization and formation efforts.

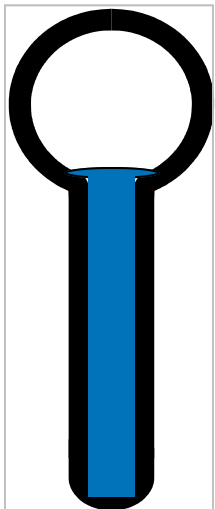
